

What is a Student-Led IEP

A Student-Led Individualized Education Program (IEP) involves students with disabilities actively participating in their education planning. They lead their IEP meetings, stating their preferences, goals, and needs, with the support of educators, parents, and other professionals.

- Students: Central to the process, taking ownership of their IEP meetings.
- Parents/Guardians: Supporting and ensuring student needs are met.
- Educational Team: Teachers, school staff, and special education professionals collaborating on goal setting and accommodations.
- IEP Team Members: Including all relevant stakeholders, like counselors and therapists.



Benefits of Student-Led IEPs

1 Promotes self-advocacy and independence
